Carpenters' union targets west Michigan company with new strategy

The Michigan Regional Council of Carpenters has been organizing demonstrations against an employer in west Michigan that does not use union workers and is, therefore, assumed to be paying substandard wages.

According to the Midland-based Mackinac Center, the demonstrators are often not members of the carpenters' union – or construction workers at all. The tactic is called "bannering," which relies on high-profile protests and putting pressure on a company's customers.

The employer being targeted is Ritsema Associates, a construction contractor headquartered in Grandville, near Grand Rapids. Last summer, the carpenters' union sent a letter to Ritsema Associates asserting that it had conducted done an "investigation" and concluded that the contractor was paying substandard wages and fringe benefits,, according to the Mackinac Center, a conservative think tank and frequent critic of labor unions.

NLRB 3-1 Rules Union 'Bannering' Lawful, Finding No Inducement of Work Stoppage

Citing the board's 3-2 ruling in August 2010 that union "bannering" is not a form of restraint or coercion of a neutral employer prohibited by Section 8(b)(4)(ii)(B) of the NLRA, Chairman Wilma B. Liebman and Members Craig Becker and Mark Gaston Pearce rejected arguments by the NLRB's acting general counsel that bannering conducted because of a labor dispute with two Salt Lake City firms constituted an inducement or signal to the employees of neutral firms to stop work in violation of Section 8(b)(4)(i)(B) of the act.

UAW Wage Cuts, New Mitsubishi Vehicle, State Grants Retain 1,100 Jobs in Illinois

Mitsubishi Motors Corp. will guarantee job security at its plant in Normal, Ill., for 1,100 employees represented by the United Auto Workers as a result of a \$29 million investment by the state and a ratified union agreement to accept wage cuts for the long-term viability of their jobs, the company, union, and state announced Feb. 4.

Mitsubishi and UAW had been under a confidentiality agreement about details of the contract and did not release any specifics about it until the official announcement was made publicly (245 DLR A-14, 12/22/10).

NLRB Orders Contractor to Bargain Minimum 16 Hours Per Week Until Contract Reached

In New York, unionized state employees have had a 14 percent raise over four years, and now make an average of nearly \$67,000. Iowa's state workers last year won a 6 percent raise over two years.

Dozens of states give pension and health benefits far more generous than in the private sector. Their costs have resulted in significant cutbacks to basic state services for the poor and middle class.
