In March 2001, I was employed on a part-time basis as a member of the UAW's in-house legal staff.

Question 11: In the ordinary course of business, each year the UAW retains more than 125 law firms, located in various parts of the United States. These law firms represent the UAW and its active and retired members in a variety of legal disputes with employers and others. The UAW's expenses for legal fees for these outside firms are reported on the UAW's LM-2 and ordinarily exceed \$3 million annually. That figure represents the amount paid in aggregate to all of these outside law firms. Each individual law firm receives only a small portion of that amount, with the actual amount paid to each firm varying considerably from year to year depending on the extent and nature of the work performed by such firm.

I am a partner in one of these firms that provides representation to the UAW. The name of the law firm is Cornfield and Feldman. The firm was retained by the UAW to render legal services beginning in the late 1980's. The UAW's use of the firm is entirely in the ordinary course of business.

Question 12: My annual income from the firm was approximately \$80, 452 in 2002. The firm has many other clients other than the UAW and only a portion of this income is attributable to work performed on behalf of the UAW.
